It also focuses the students on the tasks that need to be performed through encouraging verbal and non-verbal communication and problem solving.

Mrs Shine-Roberts and Mrs Morgan-Jenkins cannot wait for the pupils to walk through the door to start their daily LEGO build. The pupils are also enthusiastic to get their hands on the LEGO and build their model whilst learning and improving their essential skills.

This month, 40 pupils across all key stages have embarked on a year long animation adventure. With the aid of Heritage Lottery funding, they have been given the opportunity to create their own animated documentary using the latest technology. The group has been tasked with researching and writing their own historically accurate script and in conjunction with professional animators Gritty Realism, have been learning how to create a hand-drawn stop motion film.

Earlier this year, pupils took a stroll back in time as they delved into the depths of the Rhondda Heritage Park mine. Led by retired miner Anthony Fidler, the tour gave pupils a chance to experience working conditions, adding depth to their documentary and giving them an experience they will never forget. With over 1000 photographs taken on the day, pupils sourced an array of information which helped them to build up their story of days gone by. They had opportunities to experience what it was like to be a miner, and used this information to piece together their storyline.

Back at school, the pupils have been collating their information and designing their own scenes and characters. Over the next year their aim is to create a short documentary that will be exhibited at various museums and heritage sites. They will now begin to build up their unique story, retelling their mining heritage and showcasing it to the world.

We look forward to the coming months where pupils will have further chances to explore their heritage, and conducting interviews with those who lived through such times.



Maths Department Bottle Flip Challenge





As part of National Science Week the Maths Department carried out a 'bottle flipping challenge'. Every class in Key Stage 3 took part and the results for the whole department were collated.

Water bottle flipping is an activity and a challenge that involves throwing a plastic water bottle, typically full or partially full of liquid, into the air so that it rotates, in an attempt to land it upright on its bottom. It became an international trend in 2016, with numerous videos of people attempting the activity being posted online.

Pupils used many analytical and mathematical skills during the experiment as well as demonstrating their flipping prowess. It was a close run thing but we found that a bottle 40% full allowed for the most successful bottle flip!

was against us at this point and Clifton won 26 – 19. The second half performance by the Pontypridd boys was just an appetiser for the rugby they were about to put on show in their next three pool games.

The second game was against another well-known rugby school, Monmouth. Monmouth took an early 7 point lead but this would be the ignition that got our boys playing. After that Pontypridd High played perfect sevens, keeping the ball away from their opponents and stretching them from touch line to touch line. Eventually the pressure told and we ran in two tries before half time. Second half saw more of the same, not only in attack but the defence stepped up and there was no way through for Monmouth. Every kick off was contested and when possession was won back there was no stopping the play makers. Pontypridd High ran in another three tries in the second half and the final score was Monmouth 7 Pontypridd High 31.

The third game was against The Oratory School where Pontypridd High sculpted one of the best games of rugby 7's that can be played. Fast, electric play combined with hard hitting defence and composure under pressure resulted in Pontypridd High School drawing a wide audience of spectators from other schools, parents and referees. Two referees and two teachers commented that the performance by us was the best that they had seen. Needless to say Pontypridd High were run away winners by 36 – 12.

After a long day and tired legs you would have been

forgiven if you thought Pontypridd High had given their best performance in the third game and left it all out on the field. This could not be further from the truth. The boys saved their best performance till last when they took on Tonbridge School. A thrilling end to end game where there was no margin for error. Both teams played exceptional rugby 7's, moving the ball and keeping a high line in defence. Pontypridd were down at half time but the team spirit and bond was clear to see. The boys left everything on the field for each other and the badge and a last minute team try saw Pontypridd High win 24 – 21.

In the end it turned out that the first game was the group decider with only the winners from each pool progressing to the knock out stages. The boys should be extremely proud in the way they played and many other staff and officials commented on what good rugby 7's they played.

The next day the buzz around the school was amazing with pupils and staff very interested in the stories and congratulating the boys on their performance. The boys were a pleasure to take away and their performance on the pitch made a lot of schools take notice of Pontypridd High.
