

Given their confidence to get going we are all looking forward to welcoming our new (continue on page 2)


TRANSITION WEEK

CREATIVE LEARNING

This year Pontypridd High School became an Arts Council Wales 'Lead Creative School.' A team of teachers worked with a Year 8 class and a set designer to build a creative space in which they learned their 'Health and Nutrition' Science topic in creative ways – including building a giant sculpture of the human body, painting word walls, performing role plays, preparing food and writing music.

The topic culminated in the Year 8 pupils delivering a Creative Science workshop to Year 6 and Year 7 pupils. The event was organised and run by the pupils and they did an incredible job as the younger pupils carouselled

through stations that involved games, experiments and the stomach-turning 'Gums to Bums' demonstration.

Teachers saw huge developments in the pupils' skills in collaboration, resilience and self-discipline. The final testimony to the success of the creative learning approaches was the outstanding results the pupils achieved in their end of topic assessment – with many pupils gaining two or three grades higher than they had in previous Science assessments.

The team have since run training for all staff and we look forward to seeing the development of creative pedagogy and more creative learning spaces throughout the school.







SUCCESSFUL FUTURES

What and how we teach is a constant source of discussion and debate in Wales and the Government recently appointed Professor Graham Donaldson to make recommendations about the best way forward. The result is a report entitled 'Successful Futures' which has proved to be a radical review of the curriculum being taught across primary and secondary schools in Wales.

Amongst the recommendations are that a new curriculum should give opportunity to learn new skills and apply subject knowledge more confidently and creatively. Children should also receive a deeper understanding of how to thrive in an increasingly digital world. In order that to deliver this type of learning teachers will have more freedom to teach in different ways and through different themes. The purpose of the new curriculum is to support young people so that they can be:

- ambitious, capable learners, ready to learn throughout their lives
- enterprising and creative, ready to play a full part in life and work
- ethical, informed citizens of Wales and the world
- healthy, confident individuals, ready to lead fulfilling lives as valued members of society.

There will also be new 'progression points' like the present end of key stages. These will be points at which learners, teachers, parents and carers can see whether appropriate progress is being made. Such points relate broadly to ages 5, 8, 11, 14 and 16.

At Pontypridd High we have already implemented changes, in particular for Year 7 and 8 children. Such change has been put in place to enhance the learning experience and broaden knowledge and

understanding through enjoyable activities.

In September, we will be introducing a thematic skills based-learning provision in Year 7 and 8 called 'Discover' in order to provide even more engaging and high quality learning experiences.

Themed Weeks

Children learn in many different ways and sometimes, following the same timetable continuously can be restrictive. For certain weeks of the year, our regular curriculum is replaced with a shared, creative theme for children in Years 7 and 8. Visiting speakers, external trips and visits, workshops, dress-up days and whole school performances and rewards characterise these weeks. Themed weeks this year have included Shwmae Week, World Book Week and Sports Week.

Lead Creative Schools Project

As a designated 'Lead Creative School' in Wales we have the opportunity to develop an innovative and bespoke programme of learning that combines creative arts with other subjects. We are able to recruit professional artists from the Arts Council of Wales to improve the quality of teaching and learning for Year 7 and 8 children.

In our first year the focus was a scientific one with the appointed 'Creative Agent' supporting children through the project though learning is shaped and directed by

the pupils themselves. Whilst this has been fantastic fun and very enjoyable, outcomes show that everyone improved understanding and the test results were among the best ever.

Animation

The role of digital technology is leading to new approaches, skills and topics being taught that are developing the learning of our pupils in areas they would not normally be exposed to. One such example is through 'animation' which is being expertly led by Mr Craig Husband. Work within PHS and our cluster of primary schools is giving opportunity for children to develop their stop-animation skills in addition to numeracy and research skills. Historical knowledge of the area in which they live is also improving in leading to a stop-motion animation that explores the rich heritage of our local area.

A Successful Future

'Successful Futures has given us greater control over the curriculum which develops the skills of our teachers and impacts positively on our students. Donaldson called his curriculum review 'Successful Futures' and we have received excellent feedback on our provision from the Local Authority, Central South Consortium and Estyn. They believe our provision is inspiring, enthusing and challenging our learners who as a result will no doubt become very successful individuals in the future.

THE CLASS OF 2017



This ceremony is always a special occasion for both staff and pupils. Form tutors paid heartfelt tributes to each of






some humorous moments as pupils were nominated for some carefully chosen awards, with winners being chosen by their peers. This included the next Head


