WE'RE IN GOOD HANDS

Earlier this term a group of 12 pupils travelled to the WIMAT Centre at the Heath Hospital to learn about the use of robotics in surgery.

The demonstration was led by a group of professionals from CMR Surgical, the company who have designed and created 'Versius' – a next generation surgical robot. Over the course of the morning pupils learnt all about Versius and how it has the potential to improve a range of surgical procedures.

We learnt from CMR: 'Versius has been created to transform the way we think about surgery. As a surgeon recently commented, Versius has created 21st century laparoscopy. It gives surgeons the freedom of port placements, but with the benefits of fully wristed instruments, 3D HD vision, natural instrument control

and a choice of ergonomic working positions that has the potential to reduce stress and fatigue. In short, it offers surgeons the best of both worlds.'

After an initial talk pupils were then given the chance to try out the training equipment used by the surgeons and operate 'Versius' themselves. Some of the pupils showed a real flair for operating the robot and were able to use it to stack blocks on a peg board. Throughout the trip pupils conducted themselves excellently and asked a wide range of thought provoking questions.

We would like to thank the Moondance Project for giving us the opportunity to view the demonstration. We would also like to thank Finn Stevenson and all of his colleagues from CMR Surgical for taking the time to teach us so much about the next generation in surgical technology. It really was a fascinating experience for all.

Great results again this year at Ponty High!

In particular, the total points scored by each student for their best 'Capped 9' qualifications. On average our students have achieved a score of 387 points each, an increase of nearly 40 points on last year. This means that on average, each student achieved above the equivalent of a C grade in each of their 9 best GCSE results. Without question it is amongst the very best in the Local Authority.
