

STAY SAFE STAY HOME **'DISCOVER MORE' TASKS**

Since lockdown lots of jobs have been greatly affected! This could be due to working from home, having to be redeployed to a different field, being furloughed or changing the way they deliver services.

The Discover More challenge last week was for pupils in year 7 and 8 to choose up to 3 careers and research/ explain how these careers have been affected fur to lockdown. This has complimented our virtual careers week well and got pupils thinking how careers may now change in the future with working from home.

Lots of pupils got involved with this challenge, some

wrote articles, others made presentations and some even conducted interviews with family members or neighbours. I wanted to include 3 examples of the excellent work our pupils have created. Nia David in Year 7 wrote a news article about how the careers have been affected for young workers, I thought this was an excellent way to look at the challenge! Calum Sharp in Year 8 focused on two particular popular companies and how their business and careers within the companies have been affected.

Finally, Logan Woodford in Year 7 was able to arrange a Zoom video meeting with a local business owner to conduct an interview into how the lockdown has affected business and careers. Well done to all pupils who got involved!

"Before Covid-19 struck I was doing long shifts with jobs such as merchandising in the store, window displays, offering a personal shopping experience where I would greet customers and take time getting to know them and show them around our store and help pick out products which might be suitable to them. I would sometimes have customer contact when measuring a customer's particulars and shoe size. I would also operate a till and take payment for our products with cash or card. Once a week I would go on a stock buying trip to Birmingham to pick out items that would fit in with our shop and clientele." Since Covid 19 they have had to dramatically change the way that they do business. Essentially now they have taken the business online and have evolved into an online trader selling their products through the website and using social media as opposed to instore. The shop is used almost like a warehouse and the daily tasks have also changed.

A typical day consists of promoting products on social media, online merchandising and generating sales to be shipped to customers and posted out as opposed to in the shop. Customers have to now pay for their clothes via Paypal or bank transfer. They no longer operate using cash as a method of payment. We operate a click and collect service on site where customers who have

purchased clothes online can collect at the store. Items are picked and packed ready and the customer has to collect from outside the shop through a hatch.

Things are very different in retail at the moment from what was previously normal. Howells have had to adapt to survive and stay in business. Although the owners of the store are looking forward to non-essential retail being allowed to re-open and trade, they have said they will continue to use social media to drive sales as it has helped them to reach a large audience and grow their customer base.

YOUNG WORKERS

Around a quarter of 18 to 24-year-olds have been furloughed - meaning they cannot work but their employers keep them on their books and the Government covers 80% of their wages.

A further 9% have lost their jobs altogether - the highest figure out of all age groups.

Companies that employ younger staff such as pubs, restaurants and leisure centres have remained shut throughout the UK's lockdown, as have many shops, and this has meant lots of young people are left with no money to pay for their University or collage fees.

My article today will feature three areas and look at impacts on young people.

• UK Government records show that more than 3,005 young recruits have joined the police during the last few months to help cut crime and keep people safe. For many, their first role has been to join the fight to stop the spread of coronavirus, protect the NHS and save lives. How frightening must this have been for young people in their first job where they have had to help with protests and people breaking lockdown rules while trying to protect themselves from catching the virus?

• Thousands of student nurses who had been recruited to work in the NHS against Covid-19 have been told

their placements will be cut short in July 2020 and finished early. This will leave these students out of a job after all the hard work and help they have given people when the virus was at its peak. The UK Government are looking at this and hopefully will try to avoid making reductions, for now we will wait and see.

• Many school leavers join the construction industry as apprentices with jobs ranging from brick laying, engineering to project management, quantity surveying and urban design. The workload has reduced since lockdown measures were put in place and many sites had to be closed due to the 2 metre distancing rule, this has led to many young workers being furloughed or sacked by the companies who cannot afford to keep them in the company. With sites now opening back up, this will hopefully mean those young people will be employed and can finish their training and go on to having the job they have wanted.



Apple office workers have been working from home since mid-March. They have been payed full wedges, and Apple have supplied them with a 500\$/£ for them to get the work supplies they require to work from home. Apples main office building is Apple Park located in California, and only 1/8th of the employees are working from Apple Park, and these are only people who cannot work from home maybe due to the project being top secret or them requiring a <u>super</u> computer.





Amazon warehouse employees have been working inside the warehouse. The warehouse has been running a maximum capacity of $1/3^{rd}$ of the total buildings capacity to maintain social distancing. The employees have been receiving full pay. For the employees entering the warehouse they must wear a face mask, a pair of gloves, a full-face visor and an apron. For parcels passing through the warehouse amazon has included another step, all parcels pass through an ultraviolet light tunnel that will kill 99.99% of germs to protect the employee and the recipient.



Hot Cross Buns cannot be dashed off quickly but watching the dough rise is all very satisfying, and then your family can enjoy all that fruity, spicy stickiness.

Ingredients

- 250g Very strong bread flour
- 1 sachet Easy bake yeast
- 1 tsp Mixed spice
- 1 tsp Salt
- 50g Golden Caster sugar
- 250 ml milk
- 1 Eggs

- 50g Butter softened
- 100 grams Raisins, sultanas or currants
- 1 Orange (grated zest)
- Egg wash, to finish
- 50g Shortcrust pastry , to finish

Method

- 1. Put the flour, sugar, spice, yeast and salt into a bowl.
- 2. Stir in the milk, butter and egg to form a soft dough.
- 3. Mix in the dried fruits of your choice along with the zest of the orange.

4. Turn onto a floured surface and knead for 10 minutes. 5. Place in a clean bowl and cover with a clean tea towel and leave to prove. The dough will double in size, this can take up to an hour.

6. Preheat the oven to 200°C/fan 180°C/Gas Mark 6. 7. 8. Divide the dough into 8 equal pieces and shape then place on a lightly floured baking tray.

9. Brush with egg wash and finish the buns with a cross made from the shortcrust pastry.

10. Glaze once more and bake for 15-20 minutes until golden.




We are calling for pupils to take part in our blog as part of their home learning. The blog does not need to be long and can be about anything you like.
