I am delighted that Mrs Kayleigh Oliver will be the new Head of School for the last year of Pontypridd High, supported by Mr Rhys Ivins as her Deputy and my current leadership colleagues. I wish Mr Mark Thomas every success also in his role as Executive Head next year and with the new school. There are clearly many changes for everyone to work through but there is no doubt that the facilities all students, staff and the community will be able to use and benefit from will be fantastic in the years ahead.

Our school motto is 'Learning and Achieving Together' and I certainly could not have achieved anything without people working in this way. To be the Headteacher and work alongside you for so many years has been a great privilege and I will take such positive memories with me. Earlier this month, many of our Year 10 historians travelled to London to visit the excellent Imperial War Museum and to have some well-deserved fun in the London Dungeons after sitting their GCSE History exam a few weeks earlier.

Our day began with singing on the bus at 7am. After a long journey, we arrived at London's Imperial War Museum for our first visit of the day. Once welcomed by staff, our learners we free to explore the galleries of the museum, covering all British conflicts from the First World War until the present day. They paid special attention to the floor dedicated to the Second World War, to enrich their understanding of key features of their GCSE unit, 'Depression, War and Recovery'. A V2 missile was on display, many of which were fired on London from 1944. The sheer size of the bomb brought to life the damage and destruction that was caused.

The surviving spitfires and tanks on display were a treat, with some pupils surprised as they thought they might be replicas, rather than the real thing. Pupils were also able to access the brand new Holocaust galleries, showing the events and hatred that led to so much suffering. We were all so proud of the respectful manner

in which our learners conducted themselves. A short walk through the streets of London allowed us to see the famous sights of Big Ben, the Houses of Parliament and the shard in the distance.

Our final experience of the day was a much anticipated tour around the London Dungeons. Our students wanted to consolidate their knowledge of our unit on crime and punishment through the ages, in addition to being jump-scared out of their wits! A boat ride to traitors' gate started our tour, with pupils showing off their knowledge about treason, witch trials, prisons and more. Poor Mrs Cook and I were targeted by the actors to be tortured or imprisoned in cages at every opportunity! After an afternoon of shrieking and laughing (nervously), some brave students opted to ride the 'Long Drop' to end our tour with a final scream.

A long bus ride through busy London traffic brought us back to Pontypridd, where everyone was ready for a well-deserved sleep (the singing only stopped as we drove through the school gates)! All of the learners were excellent ambassadors for the school and the Humanities faculty. They engaged fully with all the fun and asked pertinent questions throughout the day. 


the opportunity to build their confidence and plan for the move in conjunction with other young pupils from different schools.

## CAREERS DICOVERED



In July we celebrated the end of Year 11 with our Leaver's Prom at Bryn Meadows Golf and Country Club.


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We are incredibly proud of the way our Year 11 pupils have worked over the course of their time at Pontypridd High School and particularly over the last three years.

### SCHOOLCOUNCIL SUSTAINABLE TRAVEL




